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What We Do



Policy and Programs

- Carries out the vital work of educating policymakers and the field about key strategies and policies for ending and preventing homelessness.
- Keeps federal policymakers and legislators informed of the needs of people experiencing homelessness and the programs serving them.
- Leads advocacy efforts on a grassroots level.

Capacity Building

- Supports efforts to end homelessness by offering training and technical assistance tailored to communities' unique needs.
- Helps design and implement crisis systems, improve systems' performance, and utilize data to end homelessness, particularly with an equity lens.

Let's Talk About an Effective Homeless Response System



Goal of a Homeless Response System that is Effective, Efficient, and Equitable:

House people as quickly as possible and
divert people from imminent homelessness whenever possible



Homeless Response System: **APPROACH**

Use an equitable systemic approach

to align interventions and resources across programs in a coordinated way around this common goal



Homeless Response System: **ENDGAME**

Homelessness is rare, brief, and one-time

- People in a housing crisis have access to immediate help, including a safe place to go
- People are not unsheltered
- People do not spend long periods of time homeless
- People exit homelessness quickly and do not quickly cycle back into homelessness



Homeless Response System: Performance

Establish systemic performance measures

- Reduce in-flow into homelessness
- Increase exits to permanent housing
- Decrease average length of homelessness
- Decrease returns to homelessness



Homeless Response System: PRACTICE

Practice Standards Across all Programs

- **Equity as the Foundation** to ensure that the homeless response system is a system where **all** who are served have a safe, stable home.
- **Housing First** approach across all interventions within the system
- **Diversion** from imminent homelessness when safe and appropriate
- **Rapid identification and engagement of people** experiencing unsheltered homelessness to connect them to crisis services and housing assistance
- **Quick, accessible, low-barrier pathways to shelter** and other crisis services with **short stays** in shelter
- **Rapid connection to permanent housing** for all sheltered and unsheltered people, *whether or not* they are matched to a housing resource through coordinated entry

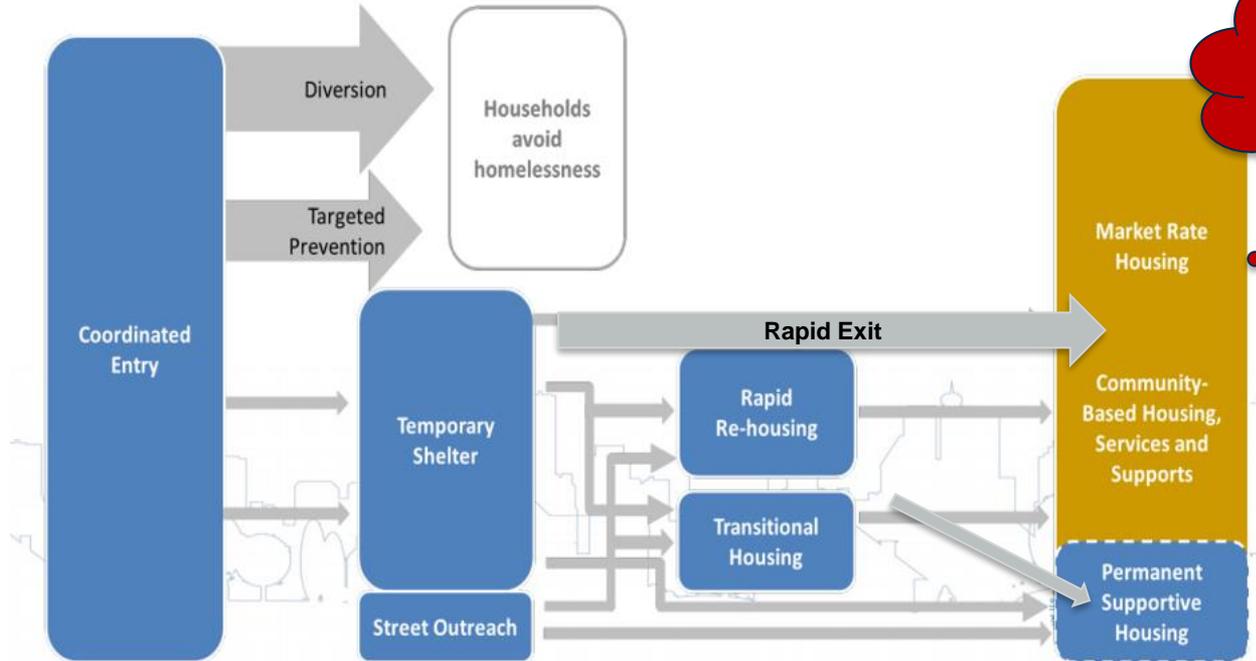
Homeless Response System that is Effective, Efficient, and Equitable Increase System Flow

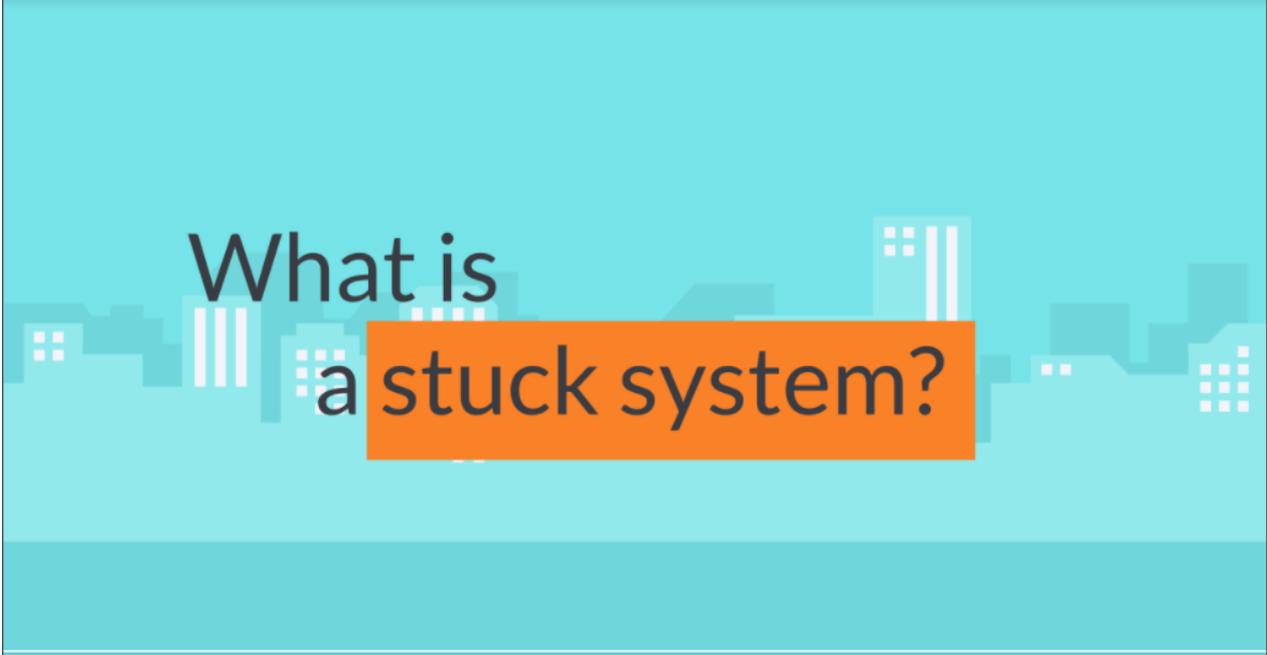

System-Wide Approach to RRH

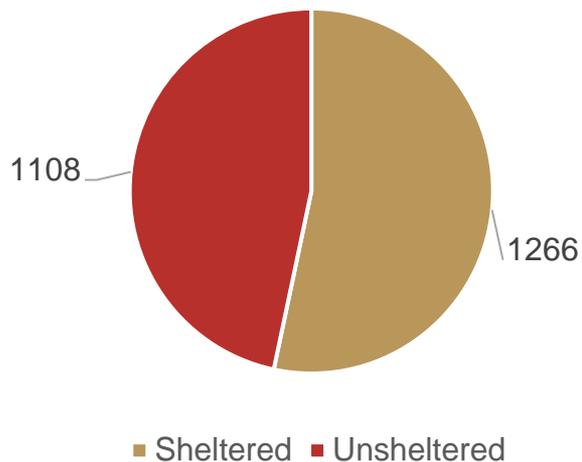


Homelessness in TX 503 Austin/Travis County CoC

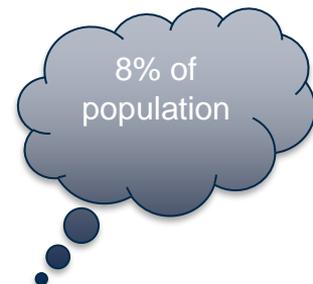
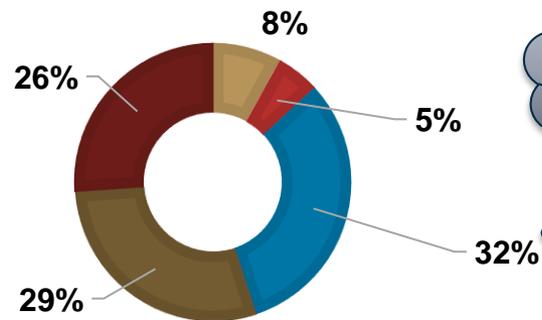


Sheltered and Unsheltered

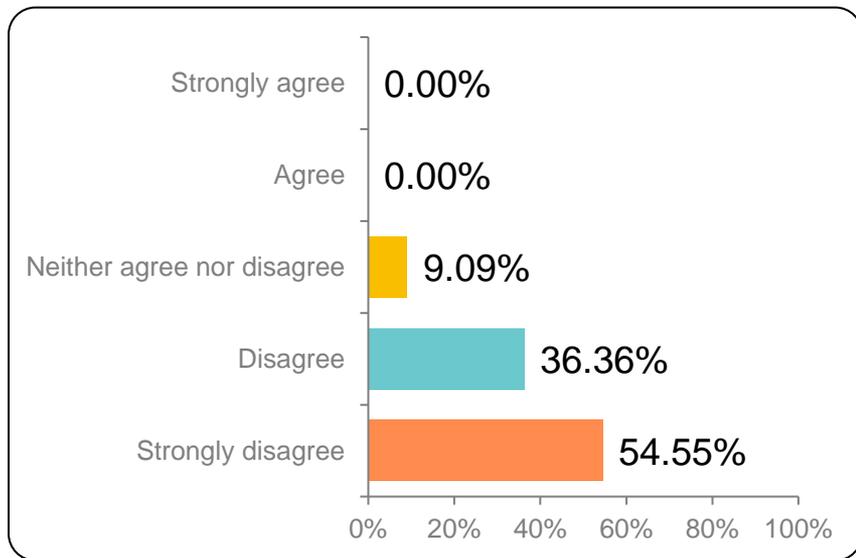

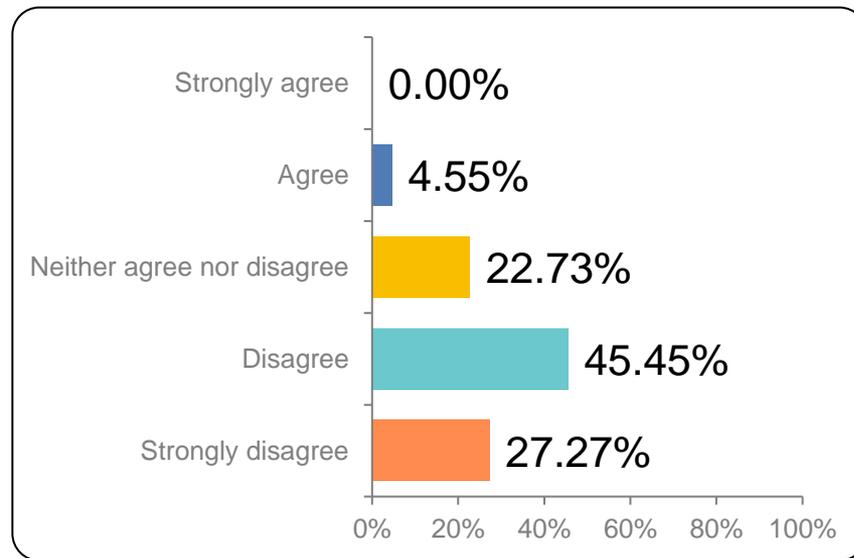


The community has sufficient rapid re-housing resources in place that assist people experiencing homelessness to be rehoused quickly should they become homeless

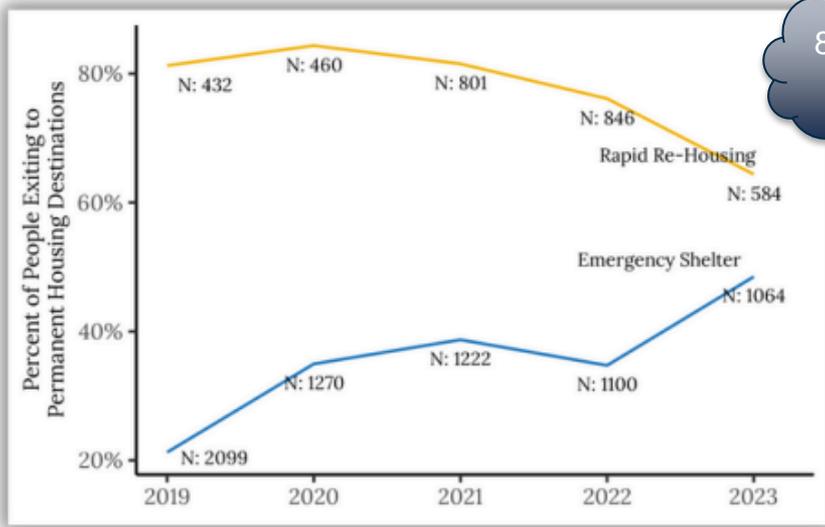

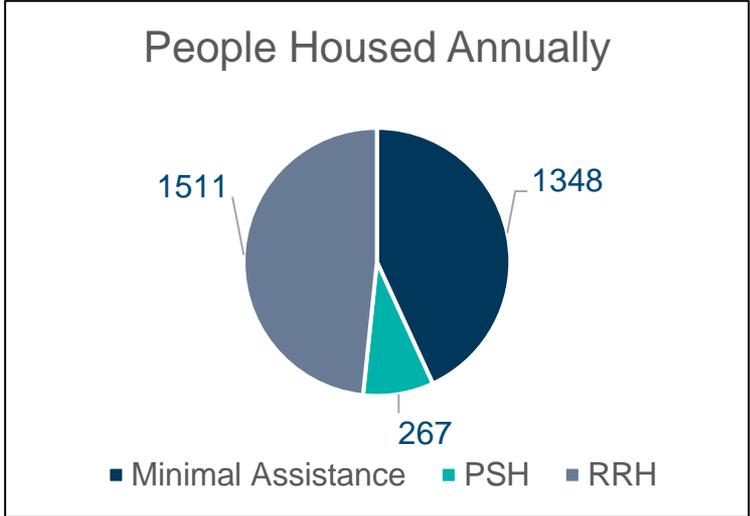

81% in 2024

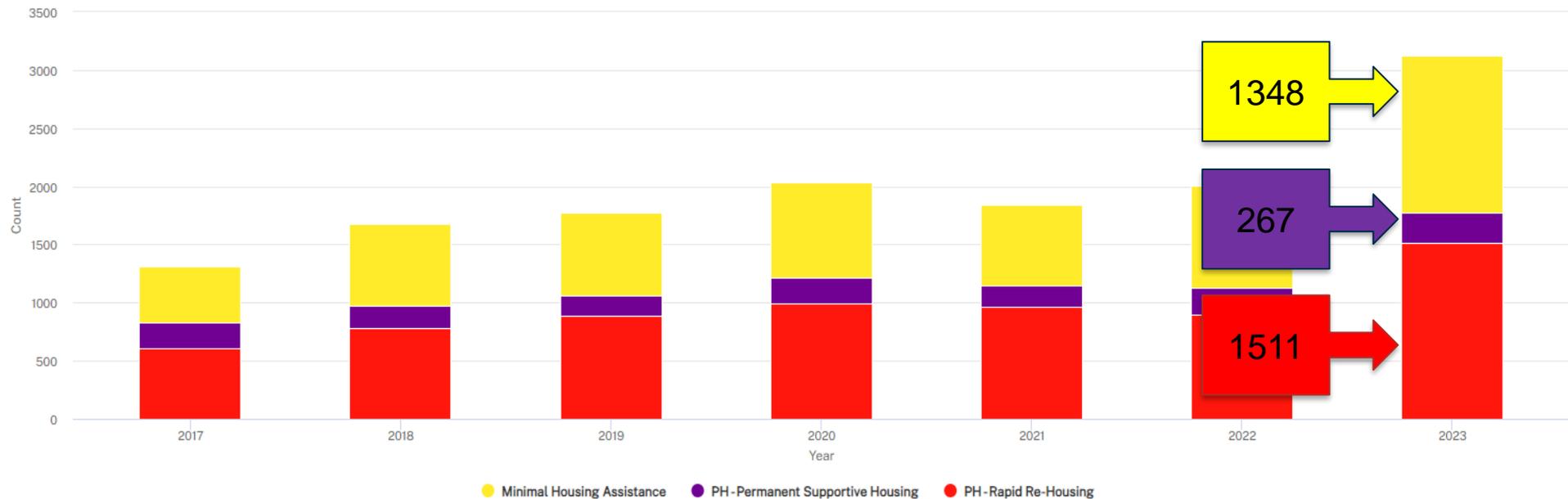

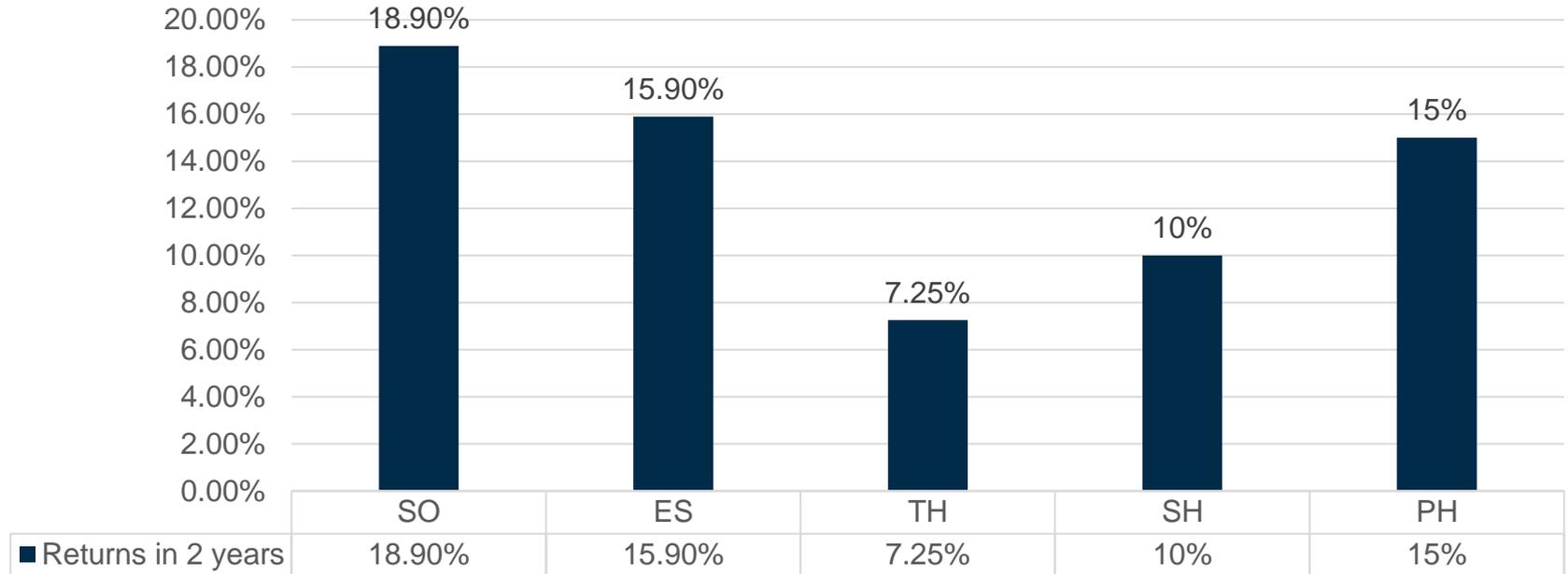
Homeless Trends in Travis County

Total Exits to PH



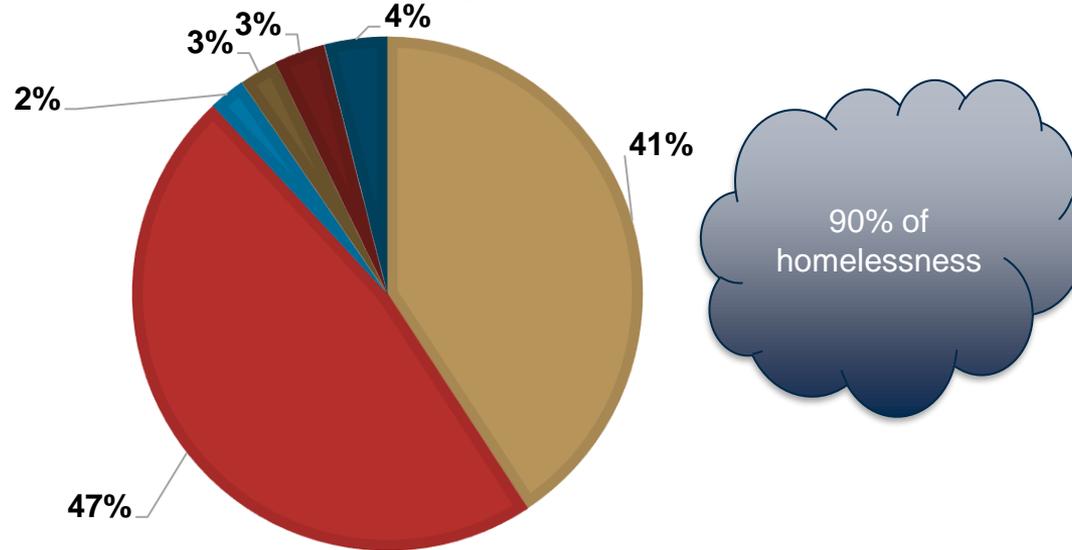

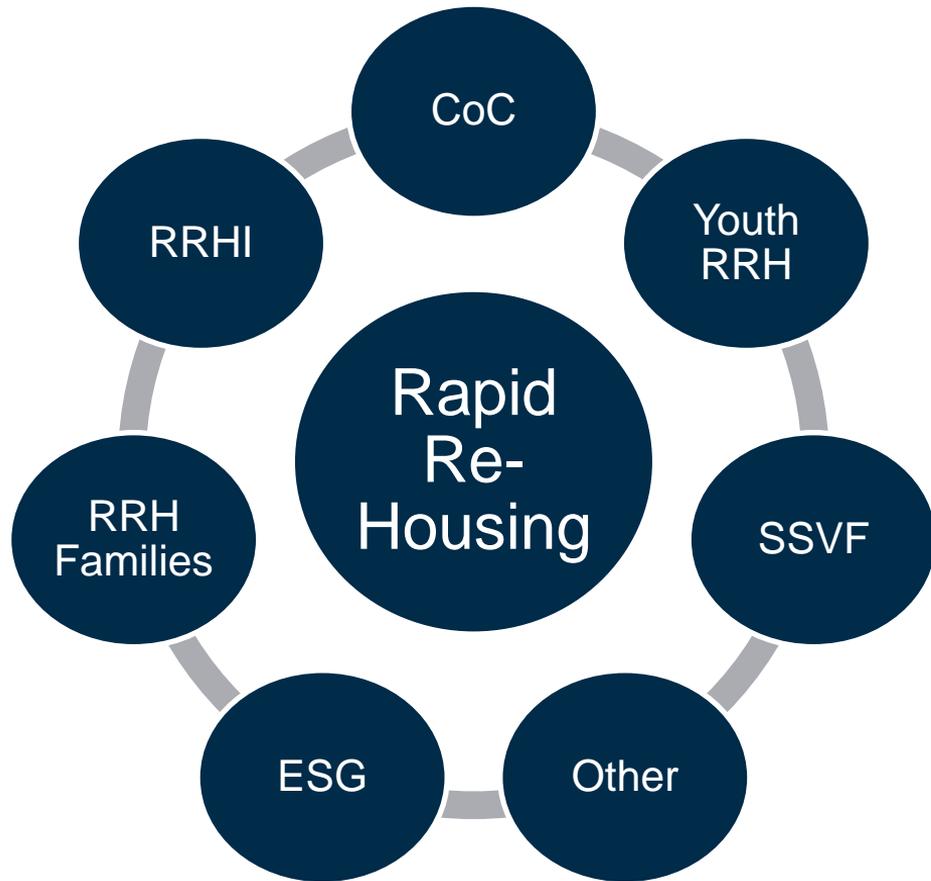
Returns to Homelessness

Benchmarks and Standards



Reminder: The Goal of Rapid Re-Housing Is...



- Move households quickly to permanent housing
 - Reduce the length of time people experience homeless
 - Exit households quickly to permanent housing
 - Limit returns to homelessness
 - Inclusive, equitable programs that house anyone, especially folks with greater barriers to tenancy

...and to do it as a system!!!

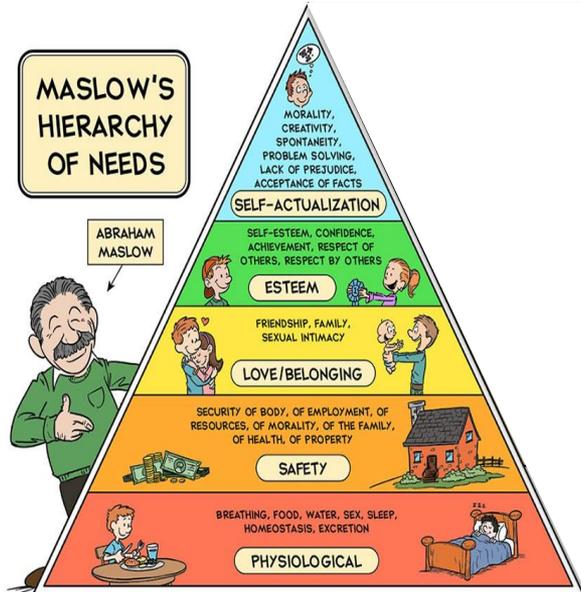
What Does Rapid Re-housing Mean?

- **Rapid:** (Adj.) Moving, acting, or occurring at great speed
- **Re-Housing:** (Verb) Provide (someone) with new housing
- **Rapid Re-Housing:** An intervention designed to help individuals and families to quickly exit homelessness and return to permanent housing



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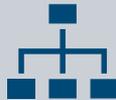
Why Rapid Re-Housing?



Housing First: People experiencing homelessness deserve housing first without preconditions.



Crisis/Stress Biology: The neurohormones related during stress drive people to unconsciously prioritize short term rewards.



Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs: Survival and safety needs will drive behavior until these needs are met. Only then can a person focus on other, "higher," needs.

RRH's three primary goals:

1. Reduce the length of time program participants spend homeless by moving people into housing quickly,
2. Exit households to permanent housing destination, and
3. Limit returns to homelessness within a year of program exit.

RRH HELPS



FIND HOUSING

Help people quickly find housing within one month or less.

PAY FOR HOUSING

Help people pay for housing short term; longer-term help an option.

STAY IN HOUSING

Help access services so people can stay in housing.

The **Core Components** of Rapid Re-Housing help people **find** housing fast, **pay** for housing, and **stay** in housing.

LAYING THE FOUNDATION FOR CLIENT SUCCESS



The Foundation for Successful Rapid Re-Housing



1. **Belief** that clients can be successful regardless of housing barriers
2. Positive **engagement** starts at first contact
3. **Empowering** clients

Shift from...

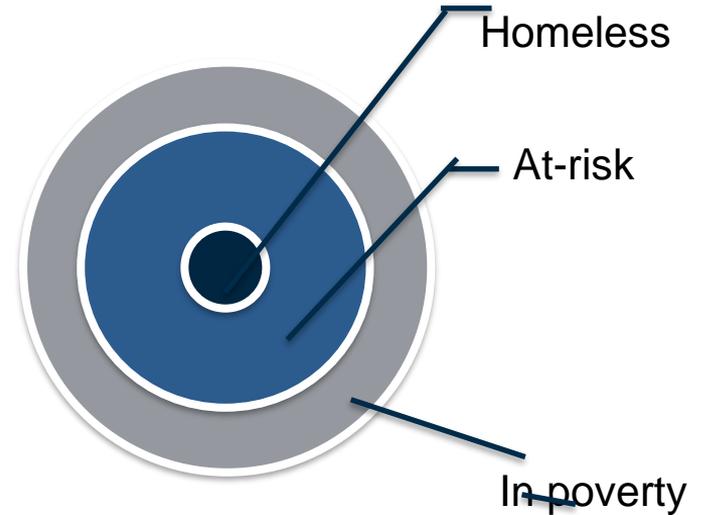
- Many of our referrals have too many barriers to be successful in rapid re-housing
- Housing cost in Travis County is becoming too expensive for RRH to work
- It is critical that people follow the rules of our program and do what their case manager tells them to be successful

To...

- Rapid Re-Housing works!!

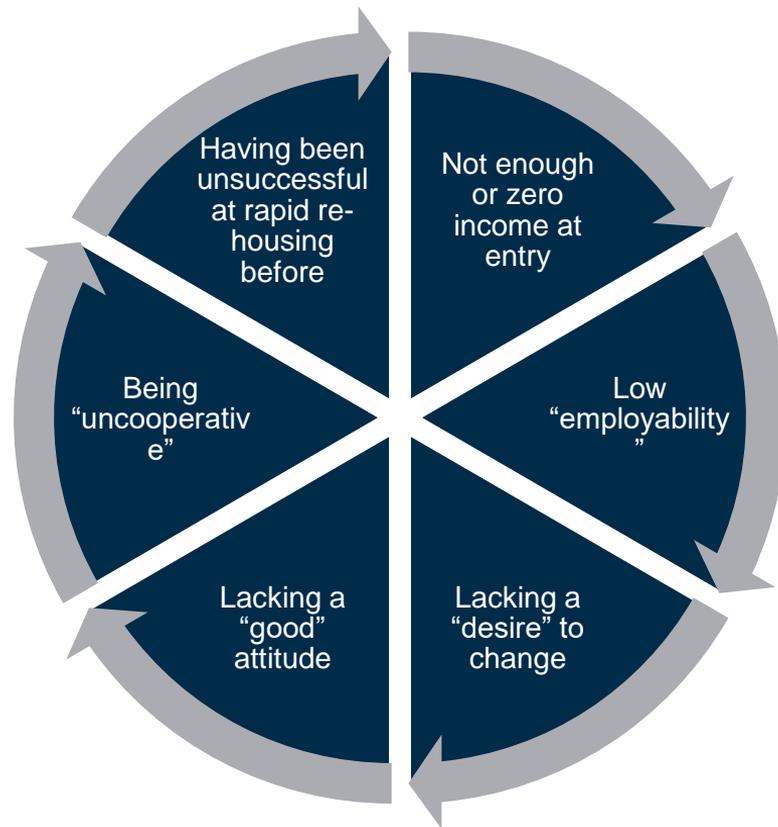

Engagement

- First contact sets the stage for success
- Active Listening
- Problem Solving
- Communicating



Engagement (It's all in the relationship!)

- Find mutual connections and interests
- Spend time listening
- Compliment – notice the good stuff
- Sell your self – what you have to offer in the relationship
- Not a one-size-fits-all approach



Empowerment

Empowerment is the degree of autonomy and self-determination in people and in communities. This enables them to represent their interests in a responsible and self-determined way, acting on their own authority. It is **the process of becoming stronger and more confident, especially in controlling one's life and claiming one's [rights](#)**. Empowerment as action refers both to the process of self-empowerment and to professional support of people, which enables them to overcome their sense of powerlessness and lack of influence, and to recognize and use their resources.



Empowerment

Focus on the spirit of rapid re-housing than “rule or program guideline” enforcement

- The program’s job is to find you housing, your job is to keep your housing...
- You can do it!



What RRH Does Do and Does Not Do

Rapid Re-Housing **Does**

- Reduce the length of time people experience homelessness
- Minimize the negative impact of homelessness on their lives
- Assist people to access resources that can help with personal goals

Rapid Re-Housing **Does Not**

- Eliminate poverty
- Assure people will have affordable housing (to pay 30% or less of their income to rent)
- Protect people from the impact of life losses or challenging situations
- Eliminate housing mobility

Engagement Strategies Debrief

- Develop trust, meet them where they are, provide their comfort zone
- Explain the truth, what program can and can't do
- Give choices

Empowerment Ideas Debrief

- Build confidence, understand the why of barriers, and build celebrations
- Celebrate small wins in a big way
- Remind them of successes – they are resilient and resourceful

Belief Statements Debrief

- Homelessness rare brief and one time
- Clients know what's best/need to be in charge
- Not everyone needs the same support
- Everyone can be successful in RRH
- We are all human and deserve housing

Things to Keep in Mind

- Households experiencing homelessness are not significantly different than other poor households
- Majority experience homelessness due to a financial or other crisis

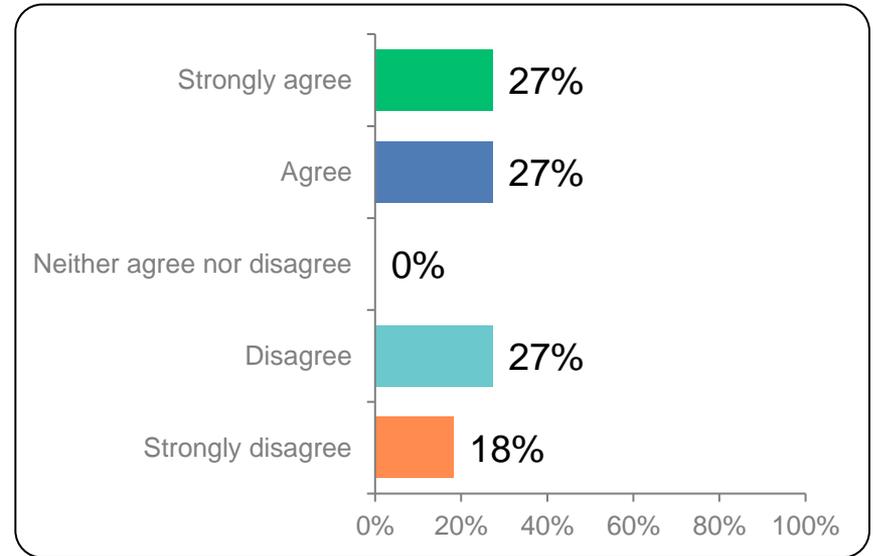


Our community has adopted a Housing First approach that helps people access shelter and permanent housing quickly regardless of any perceived barriers they may have to tenancy or housing stability.

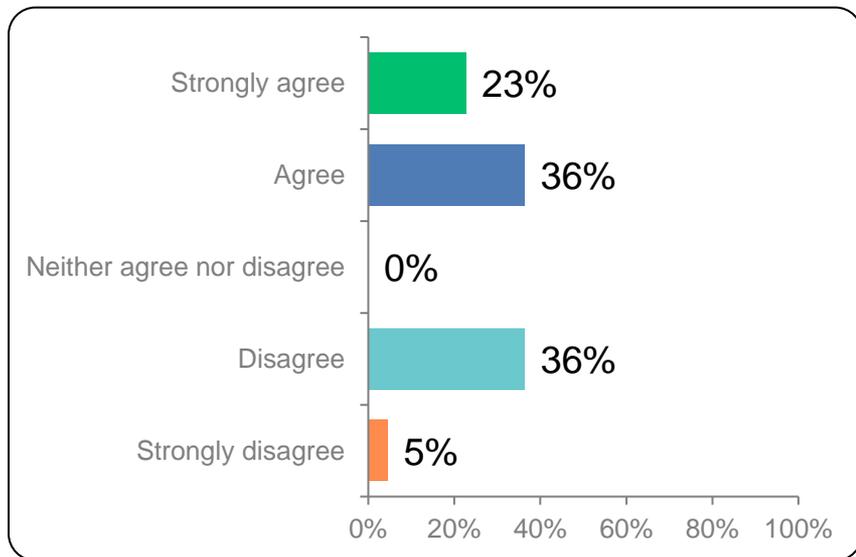


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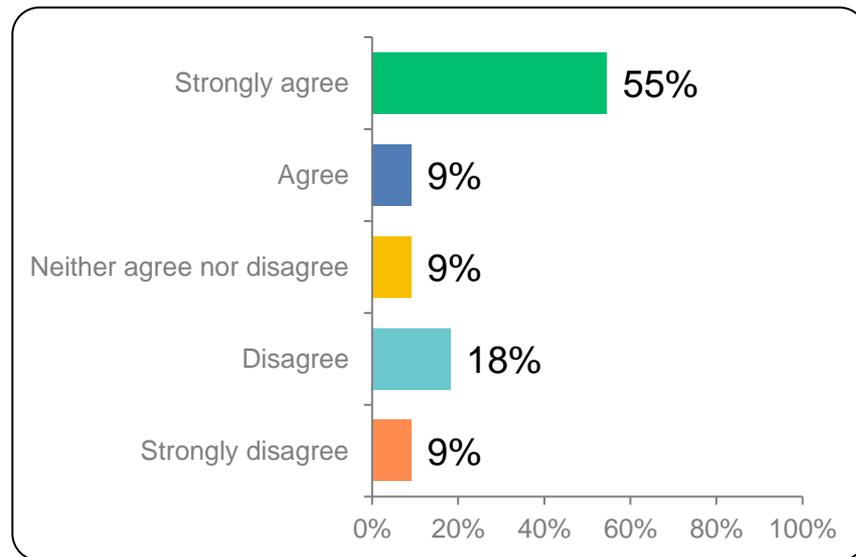


All persons experiencing homelessness are ready for housing and should be connected to housing quickly while at the same time connecting them with services to assist in their housing stability.

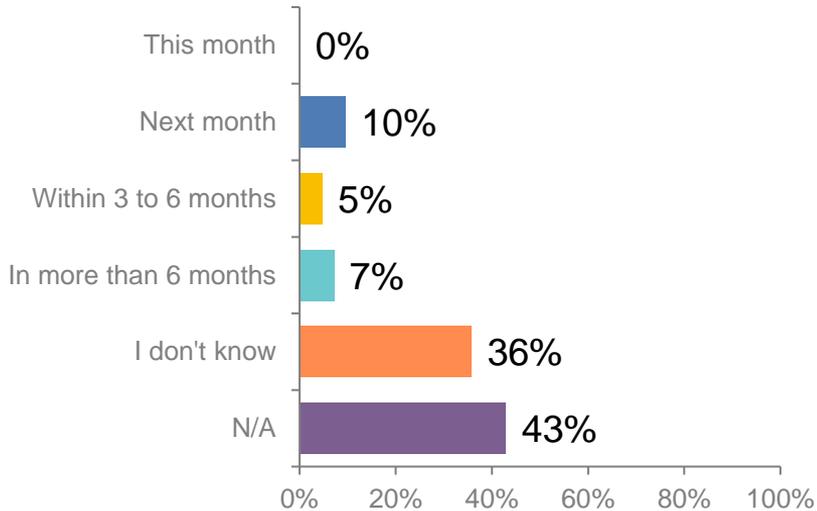

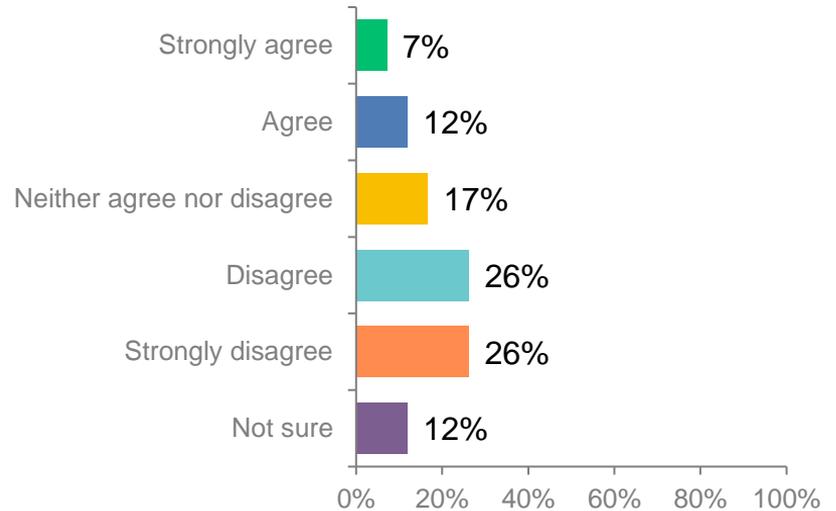


Lived Experience

Housing First Approach: Rapid Re-Housing

Philosophy

- Not a “program,” it is a system-wide orientation and response
- ***Everyone is ready for housing***
- Homelessness is a housing problem
- Housing First means housing fast

Practice

- Few to no pre-requisites to permanent housing
- Rapid entry into permanent housing
- Services are voluntary



Housing First and Rapid Re-Housing Principles



Homelessness is a housing problem

Permanent housing is a right

People should be returned to permanent housing quickly and connected to resources needed to stay there

Issues can best be addressed once people are permanently housed

Housing is critical regardless of barriers

Embedding the Housing First Approach in Rapid Re-Housing

Assess current agency/program to ensure:

- Mission statement and policies/procedures **REFLECT** a Housing First Approach to providing RRH services.
 - Job descriptions, roles, and staffing clearly **SUPPORT** a Housing First Approach
 - RRH program **DOES** provide training to board, staff, donors, clients, volunteers, community members on the effective use of a Housing First Approach to end homelessness.
- All staff **BELIEVE** that everyone is ready for housing and **DO NOT** impose participation in services as a pre-requisite to permanent housing.

Housing First

HOUSING FIRST IS NOT	HOUSING FIRST IS
Just one type of program (not just PSH)	A system-wide philosophical approach to many types of homeless assistance interventions
One-size fits only	A philosophy that values flexibility, individualized supports, client choice, and autonomy
Housing only	Supportive services that people choose for themselves are a critical part of a Housing First approach
Setting people up for failure	The provision of a foundation of stability and health through permanent housing
A way to prioritize one population over another	A way to provide a housing intervention for everyone regardless of the severity of their needs
